A Note from the Dean

Loving, Living, Learning through Passiontide to Easter

Loving, Living and Learning have been identified as three values that characterise all that we are trying to be and to do within the Church across the Diocese of Leeds. They speak of much of the good news that comes to this region – and the whole world - through the Gospel. They support the vision for the Diocese to be a part of God's Church which is developing confident Christians within growing churches that through their service help to transform communities for the better: Confident Christians, Growing Churches, Transforming Communities. This month we recall again the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. This is the foundation of the Gospel and should surely give us the confidence to see the life-transforming potential that it contains.

How can we use our Diocesan values to help us reflect in fresh ways as we pass through Passiontide and into Easter? Loving, Living, Learning. Very briefly, let us look at them in reverse order.

Learning. As disciples of Jesus Christ we constantly learn and discover more about the one whom we regard as our Lord and Saviour. Those of us who, through Lent, have been reading *Being Disciples* have been helped by its author, Rowan Williams, to see that being a disciple involves being a student of Christ. We are not to be the sort of student who turns up for the odd occasional lecture; rather, more like the students of classical times, we are to remain close to our Teacher, observing him closely and learning from all that he says and does. Certainly, we try to do this through the services of Holy Week as we walk with our Lord through the events of his passion (his suffering). And like the women who went to the tomb on that first Easter morning, we remain close to him to witness the signs of the resurrection. Of course, if we are to develop as disciples, growing in confidence in the faith in a way that can strengthen and sustain us, we need to remain close to Christ – including in worship – throughout the year.

Living. We don't have to remain close to Christ for very long before we learn that he wants the best for us. As St. John recorded in his gospel, Jesus said of his followers, "I came that they may have life, and have it in its fullness." Remaining close to Christ in the sort of study that some of us have been doing in Lent, and in the worship that can become part of our routine of life, is designed to help us and the world to be the best we can – enjoying life in its fullness. The lesson that we learn again through Holy Week is that the way to fullness of life comes through the way of the cross. This can seem foolish to the wisdom of the world, as St. Paul pointed out to the Corinthians. But it is shown to be valid and effective in the one who said, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me... and those who lose their life for my sake will find it." (Matthew 16:24-25) And the history of the church reveals that countless people have experienced a new and fuller way of

living by drawing close to Christ and 'dying' to old, none-Christlike ways of living. The resurrection life is for this world as well as heaven.

Loving. We don't have to remain close to Christ for long before we realise that the offer of life in its fullness depends totally upon Love – divine love. "God is love, and those who live in love live in God, and God lives in them" we read in 1 John 4:16. Creation itself was an act of divine love, as were all the attempts of God to put things right from the time of Adam and Eve. Through Holy Week we are reminded of the pain suffered by God because of his rebellious creation. And on Easter Day we see that his love is vindicated and the resurrection life is created through it. Such love for us can surely give us encouragement and confidence in our faith. It is this love that invites us to reciprocate with love for God, each other and ourselves.

Holy Week with Bishop John Pritchard

I am very grateful to Bishop John Pritchard for joining us to lead the Cathedral's Holy Week. Bishop John, an assistant Bishop within the Diocese of Leeds and living in Richmond, has at various times in his distinguished ministry been Warden of Cranmer Hall, Durham (the theological college attached to St. John's College), Archdeacon of Canterbury, Bishop of Jarrow, and, until his retirement in 2014, Bishop of Oxford. He has written many stimulating books on Christian discipleship, ministry and prayer. As many will know, he is a good friend of Ripon Cathedral and has led a number of courses for us over the last couple of years.

Please, do make the Cathedral services from Palm Sunday onwards a priority, as we seek to remain close to, learn from, and grow in love for our Lord and Saviour. The details can be found in this Newsletter and on the Cathedral website.

Holy Week for children at Ripon Cathedral

There is an urgent need within our society to introduce more young people to the Christian narrative, not least the accounts of how Jesus showed his undying love. Thanks to the enthusiasm and generosity of a willing group of volunteers, we are able to offer again our Holy Week event for children: Journey to Jerusalem. As the details below in this Newsletter explain, this runs on the mornings of the Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday for children of school age. On Good Friday morning, it also includes a service for all ages at 10.30am. The children will help me to lead this and the event will be followed by hot cross buns and drinks. Please, do encourage children to take part in Journey to Jerusalem and join us for the worship on Good Friday morning.

Easter Day with Bishop Nick Baines, the Bishop of Leeds

I am pleased that this is a year when Bishop Nick, our diocesan Bishop, joins us for Easter Day. Bishop Nick will preside and preach at the 10.30am Festal Eucharist on Easter Day.

Sights and Sounds of Ripon and the Tour de Yorkshire

The My Neighbourhood event, Sights and Sounds of Ripon, took place on 18 March and was a great success. Many of the city's attractions and 'good news stories' were

on show for both residents and visitors. I received many expressions of gratitude form people within Ripon who were delighted that the Cathedral had played a full and enthusiastic part. This was only possible because of the leadership of our C3 Group and the willingness of many volunteers to lead tours, run children's activities and provide the wonderful Pop-Up Café! Thank you very much to all who were involved.

This all provides a great preparation for the day of the Tour de Yorkshire (Saturday, 29 April) when the city is once again on show. With partners in Ripon, we are keen to do all that we can to welcome visitors and show them just how much there is to appreciate and enjoy in this ancient Cathedral city. We are certainly keen to give them plenty to do between the ladies' race passing through the Market Square late morning, and the men's in the late afternoon. Again, we will be offering tours, children's activities and a pop-up café. Bishop James Retires

Sadly for the Diocese of Leeds and the Ripon Episcopal Area, Bishop James retires at the end of this month. He became suffragan Bishop of Knaresborough in the former diocese of Ripon and Leeds in 2004 and then Area Bishop of Ripon in 2015 following the creation of the Diocese of Leeds the previous year. Needless to say, James has given the church and communities of this region long and dedicated service. This actually goes back before his consecration, to his days as Director of Ministry and Training (1997-99) and Director of Mission (1999 – 2004). This also included two years as Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral from 1997.

There will be a Festal Eucharist with Farewell to Bishop James in the Cathedral at which he will preside and preach. This takes place on Sunday 30 April at 3.30 pm followed by Refreshments in The Dean's Garden. Members of the Cathedral congregations are very welcome.

The Dean's Garden

The note above about refreshments following Bishop James's retirement service prompts me to make a comment about The Dean's Garden. This used to be called The Deer Park until this year, and I have no doubt that this will remain a name that many of us will find ourselves using automatically for some time to come. We have made the change, however, because of the increasing levels of confusion. Events take place there each year that attract large numbers of people from beyond the Cathedral and city. We have received a growing number of reports (complaints!) from those who have gone mistakenly to Studley Royal – where there is a real deer park!

In his memoirs, *I was Glad*, my only living predecessor, Christopher Campling, suggests that it might have been Bishop John Moorman who first described the garden of Minster House, the Deanery, as The Deer Park. I'm sure no one has ever imagined that deer have actually roamed in it! This, I suspect, was just a humourous episcopal reflection. Well, we certainly do not want to discourage humour, but

neither do we want people being led by satnavs away from our events to the attractions of the National Trust. So it is, after considering a number of options, we have decided upon the straight forward title of The Dean's Garden. The Dean and his wife are very happy about this, and are hoping that this does not create new confusion resulting in hundreds of people attempting to gain access to The Dean's Garden via the Dean's drive at Minster House. One senses that there is more humour yet to come!

The Cathedral Spring Clean

Thanks to someone disclosing to me that the Cathedral used to hold spring cleaning events, we have decided to hold another one as we prepare for Easter. This is being headed up by John Groves, one of our churchwardens, and the PCC, but represents an invitation to all Cathedral worshippers and volunteers. Report from Uganda by Robert Wood

For the last two years, the Cathedral PCC, as part of its charitable giving, has supported a small charity called Water for Kids (WfK) which provides safe drinking water, sanitation and health education in developing countries. At the end of February I joined a WfK visit to the Iganga district of Uganda to see some of the work being done. During the 11 days I was there, we changed a spring-fed muddy pool into a safe source of drinking water and we also provided a pump for a newly dug 40 feet deep well. WfK works in partnership with local communities. Local people provide most of the labour and then set up a water committee to ensure on-going maintenance, WfK funds materials etc.. We visited a number of previous schemes to check their on-going maintenance by the water committees and to take samples of water for bacteriological testing. Other activities funded by WfK include rainwater harvesting, boreholes, provision of improved latrines and health education especially handwashing. I found the whole experience fascinating and inspiring. The funds given by you are being very well used. I wish to say a sincere "Thank you" on behalf of Water for Kids and the people who benefit from its work. I am very happy to visit

local groups to give illustrated talks about the work of WfK. I can be contacted through the Cathedral office.


Jennyruth Workshops


Tour de Yorkshire at Ripon Cathedral
